## Project overview:

- In October 2021the SJ was delighted to receive one of the AJC 50@50 awards.
- The £10,000 was put towards a project which began in 2021; to improve access to our digital collections, and digitise the *Chronique de Jersey* (1814-1959), Jersey's last French language newspaper.
- The *Chronique de Jersey* is one of our most popular collections, digital access will open it up to digital search capabilities and automated translation.
- Digital access will also allow the physical collection to be removed from regular use, helping to preserve the collection for future generations.
- This project is now fully funded thanks to the support of the Association of Jersey Charities and the Jersey Community Foundation.

## Project to date:


- In September 2021 TownsWeb Archiving collected the first batch of the *Chronique des Jersey* 49 Volumes.
- They immediately began the digitisation work at their state of the art facilities in England.
- These were completed and returned to Jersey in November 2021, the remaining batch 64 Volumes was collected and transferred as part of the same trip.
- Whilst digitisation has been ongoing, work also began processing existing digital collections and developing the online search functionality, which will enable greater access opportunities.





## Project review:


- 28,000 of 53,000 single pages have now been digitised, processed and indexed.
- Tests on the OCR quality and the ability to combine OCR text with an automated translation application such as Google Translate have produced successful results.
- Custom search function capabilities developed for the *Société Jersiaise Annual Bulletin* will offer significant improvements to the accessibility of this collection which the SJ has been providing free online access to since 2014.
- The project is progressing on target, the expected completion date is still December 2022.

## Project review: OCR

An example of the OCR/Automated Translation feature is given here. The French language has been declining in Jersey for decades, by using technology we can offer ways to mitigate, what was previously a significant barrier for many Islanders, allowing wider engagement with the records of our past.
